Following Up a New Believer

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 Follow-Up Discipleship: process of bringing a babe in Christ into spiritual maturity.

II. Biblical Basis

- A. Teacher/Spiritual Parent
 - 1. Obey our Lord (John 14:15, 21, 23; 15:10, 14; 20:21).
 - 2. The Great Commission (Matt 28:18-20)
 - Abide in Christ to bring forth much fruit (John 15:5).
 - 4. Appointed to bear fruit (John 15:16)
 - Teach the Word of God and set a godly example (Deu 6:6-7;
 Tim 4:12; Phil 4:9; Heb 5:12-13).
 - Teach the "young" Christian how to feed on the Word of God himself (Acts 20:32; Eph 4:22-24; 2 Tim 2:15).
 - 7. Teach faithful men who will teach others (2 Tim 2:2).
- B. Student/New Disciple
 - 1. Grow from immaturity to maturity (2 Peter 3:18; 1 Cor 3:1-2).
 - Desire the pure milk of the Word (1 Peter 2:2).
 - Be faithful, available, teachable, and accountable (Luke 16:10; Matt 4:19-20; Prov 2).
 - 4. Be a spiritual child like Timothy (2 Tim 3:10-11; 1 Cor 4:17).

III. Initial Discipleship (1st Base going toward 2nd)

- A. Common mistakes after someone becomes a believer.
 - 1. False assumptions.
 - a. New converts will become involved in a fellowship.
 - b. New converts will naturally grow in Christ.
 - c. New converts know the how-tos of spiritual disciplines.
 - 2. Short discipleship programs.
- B. Discipling is a life-long process, but the first step is follow-up.
- C. Help the new believer get established in Christ (Heb 5:12-13;
 1 Peter 2:2; 1 Cor 3:1-2)
- D. What makes a good follow-up one-to-one meeting? WOLEP
 - Word Did we open the Bible? Did we share our quiet times?
 Does he use the five methods (hear, read, study, memorize, meditate) for getting a firm grasp of the Word?
 (Psalm 119:9-11; Heb 4:12))
 - Observe Did I touch a felt need? What did I do to meet it? (James 2:15-16)
 - 3. Listen Did I listen? Ask questions. (Prov 10:19)
 - Encourage Did we laugh? (Prov 17:22)
 Did I affirm?(Heb 3:13)
 - 5. Pray Did we pray together? (Matt 18:20; James 5:16)
- E. Resources: Beginning With Christ/Lessons on Assurance; Growing Strong in God's Family (first book of 2:7 series)
- F. Teacher/Spiritual Parent Responsibility
 - Have an interceding heart. Pray for the new believer. (1 Thes 1:2)
 - 2. Have an initiating heart. Initiate help. (1 Thes 2:2)
 - Have a motherly heart. When appropriate, be gentle. Listen rather try to fix, keep silent rather than speak, and put your arm on the shoulder rather than exhort. (1 Thes 2:7)
 - Have a fatherly heart. At times boldly exhort your new believer to take bold steps. (1 Thes 2:11)
 - Have an open heart. Be vulnerable. Be real. Be transparent. Get together. Open your home. (1 Thes 2:8)
 - Have a blameless heart. Have congruence between your message and your behavior. (1 Thes 2:10)
 - 7. Have an honest heart. Be sincere in your motives and pure in your methods. Ensure your conduct is faultless. (1 Thes 2:3-6)

IV. Intermediate Discipleship (Approaching 2nd base going toward 3rd)

- A. Serve Christ together.
 - 1. Missions.
 - 2. Serving projects.
 - 3. Share gospel together with someone.
- B. Five Pitfalls that are not so much mistakes in how we do one-toone discipling, but our attitudes toward it:
 - Problem-solving. Puts the mentor-mentoree relationship into a counselor-counselee mode.
 - Listening only. Suggest opening Bibles to see what God says about his concerns/issues.
 - Repeating the how-tos. Open his mind to new topics that touch a felt need.
 - Graduating prematurely. Advance him in his walk when he is ready.
 - Fruit-inspecting. Have a plan to take your mentoree to the next step; otherwise you could fall into the trap of "performance" checking (quiet times, church attendance, winning souls).
