- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Matthew 19.
 - B. The theme of Christian rewards is much neglected in the church today.
 - C. Christians will be rewarded for their works beyond being saved.
- II. The promise of the Lord.
 - A. Jesus goes through the last part of the Ten Commandments when asked about salvation. The last parts of the Commandments are the most difficult.
 - B. The man was still spiritually destitute even though he kept the commandments. His inner conscience was still condemned apart from Christ.
 - C. Jesus responds by telling the man to sell all he has and follow Him.
 - 1. Selling wealth is a sign of loving your neighbor.
 - 2. The man showed that he was a sinner because he held onto his wealth so tightly.
 - D. One day the world will be reborn--in the "regeneration." (Romans 8, Daniel 7:13-14)
 - E. At that time, the Apostles will reign and people who are faithful will gain a hundred full.
 - F. Jesus reminds Peter that the first will be last and the last will be first.
- III. The parable of the grumbling worker.
 - A. Different workers worked for different amounts of time, but all received a whole day's wage.
 - B. Those who worked the longest were resentful, but the master reminded them that that is for what they contracted.
- IV. Principles for our lives.
 - A. Length of service has nothing to do with the amount of reward one will receive.
 - B. Position has nothing to do with reward. Jesus is referring to equality and not inversion.
 - C. God dispenses rewards as He pleases. God is sovereign in His rewards.
 - D. God is generous in His rewards.
 - E. Every believer has a work that he or she is responsible to do.
