Judgment of the Wicked Rich, Part 1 John MacArthur

I. Introduction.

- A. Text: James 5:1-6.
- B. How one feels about money and possessions is a test. (Matthew 6:21, Luke 16:11)
- C. It is not wrong to possess money, but it is wrong to misuse it. (Isaiah 14; 10; Amos 4; 8:4; Micah 2:1-5; Malachi 3:1-5)
- D. Lifestyle often conveys that people who claim Christianity really serve money. (Matthew 13, 1 John 2:15)
- E. If one has any discretionary money, he or she is rich. James accuses those who use those resources without discretion.
- F. James calls for a frantic response to overwhelming grief coming from the judgment that will result from a misuse of wealth. Judgment on the wicked wealthy is inevitable at the coming of Christ.
- G. There are certain characteristics that bring about judgment on the wicked wealthy.
- II. Their wealth is uselessly hoarded.
 - A. There are several things we should invest in.
 - 1. God provides for our families, and we are to take care of them.
 - 2. Our money is to be devoted to his service. (Luke 6:38)
 - 3. Our money is to be used to win the lost. (Luke 16)
 - 4. Our money is to be used to help the needy. (1 John 3, Galatians 2, 6)
 - B. Many hoarded food uselessly. It had no value because it would ultimately rot.
 - C. Stockpiling riches in garments will end in them being mothy.
 - D. Money stashed for a long period of time would rust.
 - E. Hell is for hoarders of treasure. (1 John 2:17)
