- A. There are many debates about unclear moral areas in the church today.
- B. There are ten key questions to determine whether something should or should not be done.
- II. Will it be spiritually profitable? (1 Corinthians 6:12)
 - A. We want to do things that will benefit us.
 - B. This is the principle of expedience.
- III. Will it build me up spiritually? (1 Corinthians 10:23, 14:26, 2 Corinthians 12:19, 1 Corinthians 9:24)
- IV. Will it slow me down in the race? (Hebrews 12:1)
- V. Will it bring me into bondage (is it habit forming)? (1 Corinthians 6:12)
- VI. Will it hypocritically cover my sin? (1 Peter 2:16)
 - A. One should not use his freedom to cover his sin.
 - B. This is justification to do evil.
 - C. One does not want to turn liberty into license. (Galatians 5:13)
- VII. Will it violate the Lordship of Christ? (Romans 14)
 - A. God works through the conscience and it is not good to violate it.
 - B. The man with a weak conscience should be let alone so long as He is doing it for Christ in most cases.
 - C. This is the principle of encroachment.
 - D. One should not train himself to violate his own conscience.
- VIII. Will it help other Christians by its example? (Romans 14:13, 15, 20, 21)
- IX. Will it lead others to Christ? (Romans 16)
 - A. The most attractive thing about the church is its love.

- B. If we are not sensitive we will fail to demonstrate Christ. (1 Corinthians 14)
- C. This is the principle of evangelism.
- X. Will it be consistent with Christ's likeness? This is the principle of emulation. (1 John 2:6)
- XI. Will it glorify God? The principle of exaltation. (1 Corinthians 10:31)
