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- I. Introduction.
 - A. If we go into situations without knowing what to expect it can be a devastating time.
 - B. In order to be prepared we must know what to expect.
 - C. Text: John 15.
- II. Knowledge of the future is a big step to safeguard our spiritual life.
 - A. The disciples could expect rejection when Jesus departed and left the Holy Spirit.
 - B. Implications.
 - 1. This keeps our expectations realistic. The world will not express appreciation or understand the Christian—he will be rejected.
 - 2. Knowing that we will be rejected keeps us from using rejection as an excuse not to share our faith.
- III. Why we will be rejected.
 - A. Christians are not of the world. Non-Christians just know there is something different about them.
 - B. The world does not recognize who Jesus is.
 - C. Believers are instruments that God has chosen to use to convict the world.
 - 1. Concerning sin because the world does not believe in Jesus. The Spirit is constantly at work reminding people they need a Savior. The world will reject the believer because he is a reminder to them of their sin.
 - 2. Concerning righteousness. God will use believers to convince the world of their unrighteous lifestyle.
 - 3. Concerning judgment because the ruler of the world has been judged. If the ruler of the world has been judged, we can be confident that his followers will be judged.
- IV. There is peace available to us to compensate whatever rejection we will face.
 - A. The first step to understanding peace is accepting that believers will be rejected.
 - B. We are to trust Jesus because He has overcome the world.
