I. Introduction.

- A. Men do not need to worry about all the character things, because God has taken the responsibility for bearing fruit in men's lives. (I Corinthians 13, Galatians 5)
- B. The Father is a gardener, believers are the branches, and Jesus is the vine.
- C. Believers must be rightly related to the vine.
- D. Text: John 15.
- II. Branches that do not bear fruit are "propped up" not cut off.
 - A. God is committed to making people bear fruit.
 - B. God removes all the things that keep people from bearing fruit because He is after as much fruit as possible.
 - C. Our responsibility is not to bear fruit—it is to be cleansed by God's Word.
- III. No branch can bear fruit by itself—it must be connected to the vine.
 - A. Focusing on unbroken fellowship with the heavenly Father allows us to bear fruit.
 - B. If a person abides in Christ, one will bear fruit in time—it is a matter of trust not activity.
 - C. Bearing fruit is about relationship, not doing all the right things.
 - D. There is life-giving power in relationships.
- IV. The life apart from the vine is dry.
 - A. The Christian life is not rededication—it is surrender.
 - B. God's Word is the channel by which we relate to Christ.
 - C. Christianity is not about being good—it is about allowing Christ to change us.
