- A. Paul is not motivated by some humanitarian impulse.

- E. Paul counted on four things to make his life a success before Christ: (Philippians 3)
 - 1. His ancestry.
 - 2. His orthodoxy.
 - 3. His zealous spirit.
 - 4. His morality.

F. Jesus sent Paul into isolation so that he could learn to count all things he had counted on before as trash in order that he might gain Christ.

G. The first great secret of the Christian life is to stop depending upon yourself and depending upon God within. (Galatians 2:20)

III. Paul was eager to preach the gospel.

A. He was motivated and therefore committed.

B. The Christian life takes some adventuring and risking.

C. We need to be ready to step into it—the Christian life is not one of waiting for God to give us guidance even though He does guide us.

IV. Paul was not ashamed of the gospel.

A. There is nothing like it in the world.

B. Nothing else can tame human hearts like the gospel.
