# II. The servant's example.

- A. Jesus showed such absolute submission that he gave up his own life.

- C. Jesus' attitude was service.

## III. The servant's experience.

- A. Servants are by nature slaves to something.
- B. When someone sets you free, your attitude is service out of a heart of gratitude. (Romans 6)
- C. The person that is freed most is the one who loves most. (Exodus 21)
- IV. The servant's expression. (Philippians 2, 2 Timothy 2:4)
  - A. We are to be slaves to the gospel.
  - B. Christ is sold on people so we are to be also.

## V. Christians are also saints.

- A. Saints are Christians. When one becomes a Christian, he or she is set apart for God.
- B. Saints are special to God. (1 Peter 2:9)
- C. Saints are secure before God. (Philippians 1:1)
- D. Saints are sanctified in their behavior.
