- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Romans 6:15-23.
 - B. The old life is dead and it must be considered so daily, and the current life must be yielded. (Romans 12:1)
- II. The hindrance to growth is contentment with certain areas of our "self-life."
 - A. We often want victory, but not total victory.
 - B. We must be ready to have all the manifestations of self-life be put to death.
 - C. The fall of Jericho in Joshua is a picture of victory in the spiritual life.
 - 1. When one is looking for reasons for spiritual defeat, he should not pray.
 - 2. Instead, the believer should look for what is wrong in his life.
 - 3. When we covet something from our old life, we covet something that is cursed.
 - D. God has made provision for failure (I John 1:9), but we should never be content when we are defeated.
- III. Being content with some sin will never work because of...
 - A. The law of mastery.
 - 1. One can only give his heart to one master.
 - 2. If one is content being defeated, it is a sign that his real master is not Christ.
 - 3. One must take up the cross—one cannot simply have Jesus' life for our program. We receive Jesus' life for God's program.
 - 4. The Spirit of God must often show us the things to which we are clinging.
 - 5. We cannot make peace with any part of the self-life. It all must go as the Lord brings it to our attention.
 - B. The terrible loss that results.
 - 1. In Christ, there is the potential to be what God wants a person to be.
 - 2. The wages of sin is worthlessness and fruitlessness.
