- A. Text: I Corinthians 4.
- B. Stewardship speaks of our duty and privilege to discharge the truth that we have been given.
- C. We are accountable—the servant is an under-rower of Christ.
- II. Sources of pressure upon a preacher to get him to forsake his responsibility as a servant of Christ.
 - A. Congregational pressure.
 - 1. Adulation that swells the head. We cannot be pleasers of men and be servants of Christ. (Galatians 1:10)
 - 2. Manipulation that ties the hand.
 - 3. Antagonism that breaks the heart.
 - B. Societal pressure—the desire to be accepted by the community.
 - 1. There is a wrong love for prestige, prominence and power.
 - 2. God is the source of true prestige.
 - C. Personal pressure.
 - 1. Paul says that he does not even evaluate himself.
 - 2. Paul means that he is not aware of anything that he has not been willing to face.
- III. Evaluation must rest in the Lord's hands.
 - A. This takes place in the present and the future.
 - B. As Paul grew, he gradually became aware more and more of his sinfulness. The Lord gradually reveals the work of the flesh in our lives.
