The Advantage of Being Jewish, Part 1 John MacArthur

- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Romans 3:1-8.
 - B. Paul questions what the advantage of being Jewish is.
- II. Jews in many cases have had little advantage historically.
- III. Jews had no spiritual advantage either. The Jew has no spiritual securities for being Jewish alone. (Romans 2:29)
- IV. The Jews respond by saying they were attacking God's people, promises and purity.
 - A. God's people.
 - 1. They believed that Paul challenged God's credibility. (Deuteronomy 10:14; 14:2; Exodus 19:6; Isaiah 43:1)
 - 2. Paul counters that the advantage of being Jewish is adoption, the glory of God, the covenants, the law, the promises and the Messiah as marks of God's care. (Romans 9:2; James 2; Amos 3:2; Matthew 22:1)
 - C. God's promises.
 - 1. The Jews had the privilege of God's self-revelation, the Scriptures. (Deuteronomy 6)
 - 2. Paul also counters that the unbelief of Israel is not the breaking of a promise by God. God has only postponed his fulfillment until the Jews again believe.
 - 3. No matter what God does, he is right. David upheld the word and character of God. (Psalm 51:4)

2. Why is it important for Christians to understand that Jews have no spiritual advantage?
3. In what ways are we called to defend God's character today? Explain.
