The Believer and Indwelling Sin, Part 1 John MacArthur

I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Romans 7:14-25.
- B. Paul pictures a Christian who is at war with sin in his heart.
 - A. There is still conflict for the person who has been recreated in Christ. (Romans 6:12)
 - B. Unbelievers do not delight in the law of God—they are not subject to it. (Romans 8:7)
 - C. The Christian wants to do good but finds himself doing bad things.
 - D. This is not a carnal Christian—it is a mature Christian who is wise enough to see the evil within him. (Ephesians 3:8, 1 Timothy 1:1)
 - E. The problem is not with the law—it is with us.
- C. Paul has several laments describing the condition, proof and source.

II. Lament 1.

- A. Condition: the law is spiritual but the flesh is still in the believer (although the believer is not *in* the flesh any more). (Philippians 3:1)
- B. Proof of the condition.
 - 1. The sinful propensities are still in force.
 - 2. The road to spirituality is paved with one's own wretchedness.
- C. Source of the problem.
 - 1. It is not the person, but sin within that is the problem.
 - 2. The recreated person is not the source.
 - 3. There is a difference between surviving sin and reigning sin.
 - 4. The flesh is at war with the Spirit today—we are to walk in the Spirit. (Galatians 5:17)

Application Questions:

1. What does Romans 7 teach us about the reality of sin in the life of a believer?
2. How would you address a believer who claims that belief in Christ should result in immediate perfection?
3. Why is it important to distinguish the source of sin within a believer today?
