I. Introduction.

- A. Teaching is part of worship so that we know whom we worship.
- B. Text: Matthew 11:25-30.
- C. Christ constantly gives invitations. (Revelation 3, Luke 14:3)
- D. Those who are in desperate need are the ones who respond to Jesus.
- II. The Lord invites people to rest.
 - A. This is salvation rest.
 - B. Elements:
 - 1. Humility. One must recognize that he has no resources of himself. (I Corinthians 1)
 - 2. Revelation. All the truth is bound up in the Father in the Son
 - a. The gospel begins with the reality that Jesus is God. He is God's only begotten son. (John 10)
 - b. All knowledge is locked up in the Trinity. The only way we know knowledge is by revelation of the Son. (John 1:18)
 - 3. Repentance. The fact that men labor hard and cannot be relieved brings them to relief. A person must come to the end of his own resources. (John 6; 4:6; Acts 2:38; 3:19; 8; 17; 20; II Timothy 2:25; Acts 5:31; Luke 15)
 - 4. Faith.
 - a. One turns from Christ unto Christ.
 - b. Christ is the object of our faith.
 - c. To come unto Christ means to believe in Him. (John 6:35, Acts 10:43, John 3:16)
 - 5. Submission.
 - a. There is a responsibility to submit to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. (Ephesians 2:10)

b. In order for a person to	respond to grace,	there must be a	brokenness that	is
willing to change.				

c. Jesus' burden is light. (II Corinthians 10:1)
