I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Matthew 12:43-50.
- B. There have been many calls for morality.
- C. Morality by itself is more dangerous than immorality
- D. The Pharisees were moralists, but they rejected God himself in their pursuit of morality.
- E. Morality creates an illusion of safety. (Matthew 23)
- F. One must come to Jesus Christ instead of morals. Relationship precedes reformation.

II. Reformation.

- A. One would be better off to be immoral so that he could face his need for a savior than live under the illusion that an outward code makes one right with God.
- B. The Pharisees preached morality, but they would not receive Christ. (Acts 19)
 - 1. A moral self-righteous person becomes a victim of Satan more than a follower of Christ ever would.
 - 2. The disciple of moralism is dually made a disciple of hell. (Ephesians 3:17, Matthew 23:15)
- C. Jesus did not preach morality—he preached repentance from sin.

III. Relationship.

- A. Jesus offers a relationship instead of reformation—he is the only one that can fill that empty place.
- B. We can get this relationship by accepting Jesus as God's Son. (Matthew 3:17; 17:15; 18:11; 2 Peter 3:9; Acts 4:12)
