The Miraculous Feeding John MacArthur

- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Matthew 14:13-22.
 - B. The feeding of the five thousand is the only miracle recorded by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.
 - C. This is a high point of popularity for Jesus, but it also marks a time of increasing hostility and seclusion. (John 18)
- II. Jesus sought privacy. Jesus went to Bethsaida. (Luke 9:10)
- III. Jesus' desire for privacy was overruled by the design of the people. (John 6:2)
 - A. They were thrill seekers like the shallow soils. (Matthew 13)
 - B. God even pitied these thrill seekers.
 - C. Jesus felt the pain in His own heart for the people. This is a mark of God. (Jeremiah 13, II Corinthians 11, Psalm 146)
- IV. Jesus asked Philipp where they would buy food to feed these people in order to test Philipp. (John 6, 14)
 - A. Philipp says there is no resource.
 - B. Andrew points out that they do not have any money to buy food.
 - C. Jesus says to give the people food to lead them to the point where they would admit that they lacked resources.
- V. Jesus fed the people miraculously according to God's economy. (John 6:11, Revelation 19:21, Matthew 5:6)
- VI. The reaction of the people was amazement at free food.
- VII. The miracle was a lesson.
 - A. The disciples.
 - 1. He taught them to withdraw from needless danger.
 - 2. He taught them the importance of solitude for restoration.

- 3. He taught them the value of spending time with those with which one labors.
- 4. He taught them the importance of compassion for men.
- 5. He taught them to sacrifice and rest to demonstrate God's compassion.
- 6. He taught that while meeting physical needs one must teach the truth of the gospel.
- 7. He taught them to learn to obey through their inability to buy.
- 8. He taught them that God is a God of great order.
- 9. He taught that God is a steward of His power
- 10. He taught that God is generous.
- 11. He taught that we are called to provide for others.
- 12. He taught to learn to share with those who have not.
- 13. He taught to learn to trust in God as the supplier of the impossible.
- 14. He taught that God wants to provide through us.

B. The elect remnant.

- 1. They saw that Jesus was the Messiah. (John 6)
- 2. They saw divine power.
- 3. They saw creation.
- 4. They saw compassion.
- 5. They saw integrity.
- 6. They heard words that were inexplicable.
- 7. They saw the Lord's ability to meet needs.

C. The thrill seekers.

VIII. Conclusion. Many walked no more with Jesus, but the disciples remained sure.
