- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Matthew 17:22-27.
 - B. What kind of relationship should Christians have with the world?
 - C. There is a sense that we are called to be apart from the world--we are called to a higher order. (Philippians 3:17, Ephesians 2:19, Hebrews 12:22, Philippians 2)
- II. The believer is to live so as not to be criticized by the world by obeying every law. (I Peter 2:9-10, Colossians 1)
 - A. Believers should submit to the law of man.
 - B. When the world sets up laws, we are to be obedient to demonstrate that we are obedient people.
 - C. If Christianity could be reduced to an insurrection movement, no one who is obedient would be interested.
 - D. The basic principle is to submit.
 - E. We are to submit so long as the laws of man do not conflict with the laws of God. (Acts 4:5)
 - F. The king is to be honored. (I Timothy 2)
 - G. Generally speaking, governments keep rule. (Romans 13)
- III. Jesus paid the temple tax when it was required of him. (Matthew 17:22-27, Mark 9:30, Acts 2)
 - A. Jesus always paid his taxes. (Exodus 30:11)
 - B. The disciples were free from the tax under Jesus' rule, but the tax was still paid for them all. (Luke 2:49, Matthew 12:6, John 2:16)
 - C. Although we are not a part of the world system, we are still obliged to earthly citizenship. (I Peter 2)
