III. Principles for interpretation.

A. Interpret the Bible literally, unless there is some obvious reason one should not.

1. Individual words have significance.

2. One should not use the allegorical meaning because there is no way to understand what the Word truly says if one employs it.

- B. Pay attention to structure like sentence structure and Greek grammar.
- C. Look into the historical background. (Matthew 6:19)
- D. Interpret the Word theologically, but one should never build a doctrine on one verse.

E. The reason God gave us the Word is to change our lives.

IV. Ways God speaks.

1. The Bible is clear and direct about many issues of behavior such as child discipline. (Proverbs 29:13, 23:13-14)

2. The Bible sometimes speaks to certain issues through principles such as abortion through the sanctity of life.

3. God also speaks to us through wisdom in circumstances. (James 1:5)

4. God speaks through promises. (Romans 10:13, I John 1:9)

5. Sometimes, God will use the Bible out of context to speak to people but never for doctrine. (Psalm 50:15)
