- I. Introduction.
  - A. Text: Romans 15:14-21.
  - B. The Roman church was capable of effective ministry.
  - C. Paul views himself as a priest, a preacher and a pioneer. (2 Corinthians 11)
- II. The preacher has every right to boast in what God has done. (2 Corinthians 10, Philippians 3, 1 Timothy 1, Galatians 6:4, 2 Corinthians 12:11-12)
  - A. It is wrong not to give credit to God for what he is due.
  - B. Paul rejoices when the message takes root because of the glory of God. (1 Thessalonians 2:13)
  - C. There are five virtues of a master preacher.
    - 1. He claims nothing but what Christ has done through him. (Acts 14:27; 15:12;
    - 2 Corinthians 10:13)
    - 2. He is faithful to the message of obedience.
    - 3. He has personal integrity.
    - 4. His work was given divine affirmation. (2 Corinthians 12:12, Mark 15:20)
    - 5. His work is completely fulfilled.
- III. Paul was called to the unreached people as a pioneer.
  - A. Some are called to pastor and some are called to be a missionary—both are needed.
  - B. Paul was called to be a missionary.
  - C. However, we should all seek to be a part of Christ being preached in new places.
