- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: 2 Corinthians 1:12-14.
 - B. Conscience is an internal entity that accuses or endorses us. (Romans 2)
 - C. Conscience is the highest court.
 - D. Paul was attacked on a personal, relational and spiritual level by false teachers related to the Corinthian church
 - E. Paul appeals to his own conscience to defend himself: he has renounced sin personally, relationally and spiritually.
- II. The conscience is the purest point of human accountability. The conscience cannot be fooled.
- III. Paul was sensitive toward his conscience. (Acts 23:1, 1 Timothy 3, 2 Timothy 1:3)
 - A. Paul wanted to be at peace with himself.
 - B. He was at peace with his personal life living unto holiness without secret sins and with godly sincerity. (1 Corinthians 15:10)
 - C. Conscience is the highest human court, but it is not divine--Paul was not claiming to be perfect. (1 Corinthians 4)
 - D. Paul was at peace with his relational life. His relationship with the Corinthians was honest--he had no ulterior motive other than to communicate truth.
 - E. Paul was at peace with his spiritual life.
 - 1. He did not twist the truth of God for his own gain.
 - 2. He looked forward to Jesus' return because he was confident that he would be able to boast in his work for God. (1 Thessalonians 2:19-20, 1 Corinthians 4:5)
