The Joy of Ministry, Part 4 John MacArthur

I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Philippians 1:12-26.
- B. It is part of spiritual greatness to want to be with Christ intimately, so there is tension between wanting to stay on earth and wanting to be with Christ in heaven.
- C. Paul experienced this but he assures that the Philippians that he had great joy related to his ministry.
- D. Paul's point was that joy did not come from his circumstances.
- E. Paul had two great desires.

II. Remaining in the flesh.

- A. This means living physically. (2 Corinthians 5,, Galatians 2:20,1 Peter 4:2)
- B. Paul sought to bear fruit in the world: righteous deeds and people. (Romans 1, Philippians 1:11, Galatians 5)
- C. Fruit comes from work.

III. Being away with the Lord.

- A. Paul says he does not know which he would choose.
- B. He felt pressured from both sides.
- C. Paul's departure is a way of talking about his death. (2 Corinthians 5)
- D. Paul just wanted to be with Jesus Christ.
- E. One is immediately in the presence of Christ when he or she dies. (Acts 7, 2 Corinthians 5:6)
- F. We will always be in the presence of Christ after death.
- G. Advancing faith is accompanied by increasing joy.
- IV. Paul was ultimately released from prison. What matters is that Christ is preached. Paul is our example.

Application Questions:

1. Why is Paul's response different than those who want to die because of difficult circumstances
2. Is Paul morbid in his desire for death? Explain.
3. How is Paul a model for ministry for us in this passage? How can one =go about cultivating the same heart for Jesus and his work? Explain.
