Night People—Day People, Part 2 John MacArthur

- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: 1 Thessalonians 5:11.
 - B. Paul distinguishes night people (who dwell in darkness and chained in sins) and day people. (Psalm 107:10, Matthew 4:12, Acts 26:15)
 - C. We come to the light by faith in Jesus Christ. (Colossians 1:13, Ephesians 5)
 - D. The Thessalonians had a healthy fear of God's judgment. This caused some anxiety. (Malachi 3:16)
- II. Paul assures that God has always promised to secure the righteous.
- III. We should be encouraged by our nature, our behavior and our destiny.
 - A. Our nature--we are not in the realm of darkness. We have a new nature.
 - B. Our behavior--only day people can do the deeds of the day.
 - 1. We are continually armed.
 - 2. Faith protects us from temptations that question our credibility. The most important thing we can learn as a Christian is the character of God to base our lives on.
 - 3. All sin reflects a failure of loving God as the supreme object of one's affection. (Romans 13)
 - 4. Hope gives us something to look forward to. A heart filled with the hope of what it can become will keep one pure. (1 John 3:3)
 - C. Our destiny--God has not destined us for wrath.
 - 1. Wrath can be general or refer to a specific day. (Matthew 3:7, Romans 2:5-8, Ephesians 5:6, Revelation 11)
 - 2. The believer is destined for neither.
 - 3. God's wrath is paid for by the sacrifice of Christ. (2 Corinthians 5:17; John 10:11; 14)
- IV. Conclusion: night people be warned; day people be comforted.
