- D. We are not heard for many words, but we are heard for the cries of our hearts. (Matthew 6:7)

- F. Persistent prayer marked the early church. (Acts 14; 12; 1 Thessalonians 3:10; Colossians 4)
- G. We pray persistently and simultaneously rejoice at all that he has done.

- B. Desire for fellowship with God. (Psalm 42:1; 63; 84; 27)
- C. Desire for needs to be met. (Matthew 6:11)
- D. Desire for wisdom.
- E. Desire for deliverance from trouble. (Psalm 20:1, Jonah 2:1)
- F. Desire for the release from fear and worry. (Philippians 4, Psalm 4)
- G. Desire to offer thanks for past blessings. (Psalm 44)
- H. Desire to be free from the guilt of sin. (Psalm 32:3)
- I. Desire for the salvation of the lost. (Romans 10:1, 1 Timothy 2)
- J. Desire for the spiritual growth of believers. (Ephesians 1:15; 3:14-16)
