## The Glory of God J. Dwight Pentecost

## I. Introduction.

- A. God is a God of infinite glory that cannot be contained—it must be revealed.
- B. The creature should worship the Creator. In order for this to happen, God must reveal Himself. (Romans 1)
- C. Text: Exodus 3:2.
- II. God's glory was His goodness. (Exodus 33)
  - A. In order to protect Moses and show him His glory, God shielded His face before Moses.
  - B. The revelation was given to Moses in order that God might ultimately reveal Himself to His people. (Exodus 34)
  - C. Moses was not able to enter the tabernacle because of the glory of God present there. (Exodus 40)
  - D. The revelation of the glory of God was so powerful that the people were unable to stand. (I Kings 8)
- III. God withdraws His glory when the people are disobedient. (Ezekiel 8, 9:18)
  - A. Jesus became the next channel, whom God revealed Himself to men. (John 1)
  - B. Even Jesus' glory had to be veiled in order to protect man. The glory of Christ was revealed at the Transfiguration.
  - C. Jesus asked that the Father restore His full glory at the crucifixion.
- IV. Believers are in the world to create a thirst for the glory of God—they are salt.
- V. In the end, Christ will again be the channel by which God reveals Himself. (Revelation 10:1)
