C. Joy is a result of God's salvation. (Psalm 4:7; Isaiah 35:10; 61:10; Luke 2:10; 1 Thessalonians 1:6; 5:16)

D. There are things that can uncover the joy of salvation.

II. Confidence in a protected inheritance. The joy of future inheritance is guaranteed by the resurrection and the Holy Spirit. (Colossians 3; John 16; Romans 5:2, 12; Ephesians 1:13)

III. Confidence in a proven faith.

- A. God brings trials into our lives to prove our faith.
- B. The great thief of the joy of salvation is doubt.
- C. Principles.
 - 1. Trouble does not last.
 - 2. Trouble serves a purpose.
 - 3. Trouble brings pain.
 - 4. Trouble comes in many forms.
 - 5. Trouble should not diminish joy.

D. If a Christian comes out of suffering without having failed, his faith is proven. (Exodus 16:4, Deuteronomy 8:2)

E. Proven faith is more precious than gold—it lasts.
