II. The Lord looks not on the outward appearance but at the heart. (I Samuel 16, Ruth 4:17-22)

- A. Appearances can be deceiving.
- B. God is concerned about our hearts. (Psalm 51:6, Proverbs 4:23, Matthew 15:15)
- C. Hypocrites were people who pretended to be something that they were not.
 - 1. Outward change that is not internal cannot sustain itself.
 - 2. Jesus is concerned with cleaning the inside of the cup. (Matthew 23:25-26)
 - 3. The opposite of a hypocrite is a witness.
- D. We change the heart through the law of God—the Word of God refreshes the heart. (Psalm 19:7)

- 2. We must read the Word.
- 3. We must study the Word.
- 4. We must memorize the Word.
- 5. We must meditate on the Word. (Joshua 1:8)
- 6. We must apply the Word.
