I. Introduction.

- A. Jesus is not only the Lord of the universe—He is the Lord of our lives. (John 15)
- B. God works in our life in order that we might be fruitful.
- C. Texts: Matthew 13, John 12:24.

II. We are "seeds."

- A. If you are a child of the king Jesus, you are a seed among other things.
- B. We need to perceive ourselves this way.

III. Jesus is the farmer.

- A. The key word is available.
- B. The farmer decides where the seed will go.
- IV. The field is the world. We must be available to serve wherever God wants us.
- V. Unless the seed dies, it abides alone. If it dies, it bears much fruit.
 - A. Many believers abide alone because they are unwilling to die.
 - B. The believer who hates his life will bear fruit.
 - 1. One's life is the sum total of all his or her activities and relationships. (Luke 14:25-26)
 - 2. We must esteem our life as nothing in comparison to our love for Christ.
 - C. We have to be open-handed about our possessions and relationships.
 - D. Jesus Christ wants obedience and surrender from us.
- VI. The seed that dies forms deep roots. (Isaiah 37:31, Romans 7:4)
- VII. The rooted seed lives and bears fruit in season. (Psalm 1)
 - A. Each seed bears fruit in its own season.
