II. Deep, interpersonal relationships.

- A. We motivate through empathy, communication and motivation.

- C. Close relationships should be sought after and evaluated soberly. (Romans 12:3)
- D. Be loving, ask questions and share your life. (Romans 15:7)

III. Fellowship with the community.

- A. We need to see ourselves as the center of concentric circles.
- B. We need to have a group where we are receiving help and giving help to others.
- C. Every believer needs to know who his or her group is. (Acts 16:10, II Corinthians 8:5)

IV. Great truths.

- A. The vast majority of our problems are related to our concept of God.
- B. We simply refuse to believe at times that God is as infinite and wonderful as the Bible claims.
- C. Only by pride comes contention. (Proverbs 13:10)
- D. The stress on Bible study is so that the great truths of the Scripture will be a part of one's fiber. (II Timothy 3:10)
- E. This involves what a person believes and why he believes it.
