 - A. 1 Samuel 14:6-7.
 - 1. Jonathan and his armor bearer.
 - 2. God is not in the numbers game. God tends to work through individuals and small groups.
 - 3. One unnamed armor bearer had the heart of a servant that opened up the door for victory.
 - a. New Testament examples.
 - 1) Paul and his companions endeavored to go to Macedonia.
 - 2) In Luke we must be faithful to that which is another man's to receive our own.
 - 4. The servant heart makes other people look good.
 - B. 1 Samuel 18.
 - 1. Jonathan had this same kind of relationship with David.
 - 2. Their souls where knit together.
 - a. This was more than being knit by the externals and by organization.
 - b. A knitting in the inner man occurred here.
 - C. Romans 15:5.
 - 1. Be likeminded, one toward the other, with the same spirit.
 - 2. This does not mean that everyone has to have the same temperament or tastes.

3. It is rather characterized by service and an apathy towards one's reputation.

D. 1 Corinthians 10.

- 1. Paul beseeches the believers that they would speak the same thing.
- 2. This is referring to the same manner, spirit, and concern.
- 3. There are no divisions among the believers here.
 - a. There is room for a variety of opinions.
 - b. But for essentials, there should be unity.

E. Philippians 1:27.

- 1. Be of one mind striving together for the advancement and defense of the gospel.
- 2. When on a team if you have seven members you ought to have seven brains, seven hearts, but one mind and one heart.

III. Implications of the one hearted community.

- A. There was a spirit of generosity.
 - 1. If we are pilgrims to another world, we have accumulated an awful lot of baggage from this world.
 - 2. "When in doubt, throw it out."
 - 3. Travel light.
 - 4. Enemies of the cross are earthly minded. (Philippians 3)
 - 5. We ought to be givers, not possessors.
- B. There was a spirit of service.
- IV. Consequences of those implications.
 - A. There was a spirit of power; lives were changed.
 - B. People were attracted to their witness.
 - 1. Jesus taught with gentleness and firmness that attracted people.
 - C. Paul's example: he taught "not in word only..." (1 Thessalonians)
 - 1. How much better a word and an action.
 - 2. There is power that changes lives with this.
