God needs to restore your perspective as you continue to make a valuable contribution to the work of God.

- I. The anatomy of a ministry is our topic today.
 - A. A friend of mine serves on the board of several missions organizations.
 - 1. He doesn't speak much but he is insightful, asking about the bottom line on issues.
 - 2. What's the bottom line of the Christian life and ministry?
 - 3. How will your life and ministry be evaluated in the end?
 - 4. This question is evaluated by three questions taken from one Scripture.
 - B. Make it your aim to present yourself to God as one approved, who does not need to be ashamed, correctly handling the word of God. (2 Timothy 2:15)
 - 1. Is the Lord well pleased with you?
 - a. It is possible to be successful with men but displeasing to God.
 - b. We can serve God in the flesh and please men but fail to please God.
 - c. I realized early on that I am dependent on the response of people to me as I minister.
 - d. If someone thanked me I was pleased, but this led me to realize I was serving people, not God.
 - e. This is a shallow plane where most of us live.
 - 1. During a plane delay the passengers were verbally upset with the stewards who tried to appease the irate passengers.
 - 2. I was impressed with one steward who showed much patience with a particularly upset passenger.
 - 3. She later told me she works for Jesus Christ, and every day she prays for opportunities to witness for Christ by words and by actions.
 - f. We will all stand before the Lord to give an account of our lives.

- g. If we don't have the right perspective we will be more concerned with what people say to us than what Christ says.
- h. Jesus was pleasing to the Father, delighting to do his will, and Jesus delighted in the will of his Father.
- i. Have you ever realized that notable leaders will be demoted in the kingdom of God and that little known servants now will eventually be promoted in the kingdom?
- j. God looks for those who will serve wholeheartedly in whatever position they are placed.
- k. We become the products of what we read, so I want to recommend three books.
 - 1. J. D. Philips' Your God is too Small.
 - 2. A. W. Tozer's The Knowledge of the Holy.
 - 3. J. I. Packer's Knowing God.
- 2. Is the work you do well done?
 - a. This involves the pursuit of excellence, as a workman who does not need to be ashamed.
 - b. People with gifts tend to arise rather than develop.
 - 1. Michelangelo destroyed art work that was not right.
 - 2. Many students are like Niagara Falls, where the power goes over the precipice.
 - c. Why will some people be ashamed workmen?
 - 1. Operating without standards;
 - i. Allowing the culture to flow into your life.
 - ii. Mediocrity is not fitting for God.
 - iii. My father was a military man, introducing me to Napoleon, who countermanded the order to shoot a man named Napoleon, telling him to either change his name or change his behavior.
 - 2. Operating without sacrifice.
 - i. Quality work costs us something, as David who would not offer up to God that which cost him nothing. (2 Samuel 24:24)

- ii. Service that counts is service that costs.
- iii. We need to do our best work for the Lord.
- iv. Navigators will give account for every letter you write.
- 3. Is the word well used?
 - a. This involves a passion for truth.
 - b. One who correctly handles the word of truth is like a skilled craftsman.
 - c. This involves three things.
 - a. You must know the word of truth, not just memorize it, and your knowledge needs to be increasing.
 - i. There is a famine for the word of God today.
 - ii. Many have had an experience, but few really know the Word
 - iii. Fewer evaluate their experiences in light of the word.
 - b. You must live the truth.
 - i. A simple but real understanding of the word is worth more than much sophisticated veneer.
 - ii. I spend much time with Christians and find it enjoyable to spend time with pagans who are real in their unbelief.
 - c. You must share the word.
 - i. No Christian can spend too much time in the Christian community without shriveling up.
 - ii. I minister to the Cowboys to share the word of God and heard a football player talk about reading in the word about how God gives boldness to speak the word to the world. This man won the Super Bowl and had a chance to share how the day he received Christ was greater than the day he won the Super Bowl.
- C. We all want to come to the end of our ministries by realizing that the Lord is well pleased.
 - 1. Some of the greatest ministry at Dallas Theological Seminary is done by students ministering to other students.
 - 2. As we minister to each other we function as a body that pleases God.
 - 3. God greatly blesses and used us as we minister in ways that are pleasing to him.
