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- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: II Corinthians 4.
 - B. There is something ahead for us in this life.
- II. Heaven is not quite as many have imagined.
 - A. It is not merely sitting around on a cloud.
 - B. The tree of life is a symbol of what God has for us. (Romans 5)
 - 1. The constant inner renewal and our outer decay points to something beyond. One finds himself growing if he is walking with the Lord.
 - 2. The present trouble the believer goes through prepares one for something beyond. A weight of glory is being prepared for the believer. (II Corinthians 11)
 - 3. Our unseen hope suggests that something greater is coming.
 - C. The Christian's privilege is to know something that others do not.
 - 1. The Christians know that they live in a tent right now—our body now is not intended to be permanent.
 - 2. The body that we have is beyond anything of human design.
 - 3. The body is already in existence in heaven.
 - 4. This body is a super body. (I Corinthians 15)
 - D. What happens between death and the resurrection.
 - 1. Some say that there is soul sleep, but Paul talks about being absent from the body and present with the Lord.
 - 2. In eternity, everything happens at once—time is not a matter of concern for God.
 - a. In God's perspective, everything is happening now.
 - b. Time is relative.
 - c. When a believer dies, he immediately experiences the coming of the Lord.
 - d. At the moment of death, a believer steps into his new resurrected body.

- e. All believers will be perfected together.
- E. The resurrection body will be responsive to the demands of the spirit. With this provision, God opens up the entire universe.
- III. The believer always has good courage.
 - A. The Spirit has been given as a down payment for the resurrection body. We operate on resurrection power.
 - B. In either case, we are home. Whether in the body or away, the aim is to please God through faith. (Hebrews 11)
