I. Introduction.

- A. In order to be motivated to use the Bible, we must be convinced of its authority and value.
- B. In order to be able to use the Bible, we must know it.

II. Use of the Scriptures.

A. The primary concern is the use of the Scriptures and not the knowledge of it. (Hebrews 5)

B. The use of the Scriptures leads to maturity. (Joshua 1:8)

C. God will manifest himself to you when you use the Scriptures. (John 14:21; Matthew 7:24)

D. God is looking for a certain heart attitude toward his Word. (Isaiah 66:1-2; 1 Chronicles 10:13; Acts 13:22)

E. Obedience is practical. (1 Kings 8:61; 2 Chronicles 15:9)

III. In order to be motivated to use the Bible, we must be convinced of its authority and value.

A. The source of the Scriptures is God himself, which gives them authority. Our response should be...

- 1. Accept it by faith.
- 2. Obey it. (John 7:17)
- 3. Use it as the sword of the Spirit. (Ephesians 6:17)

B. The value of the Scriptures has to do with the personal benefit to you in your ministry. (2 Timothy 3:6; John 17:17)

- 1. It develops faith. (Romans 10:17)
- 2. It strengthens us. (Acts 20:32)
- 3. It cleanses us. (John 15:3)
- 4. It aids us in victory over sin. (Psalm 119:11)
- 5. It is a guide. (Psalm 119:105)
- 6. It searches the motives of our hearts. (Hebrews 4:12)
- 7. It brings joy. (Jeremiah 15:16)
- 8. It produces peace. (Psalm 119:165)

9. It is profitable for doctrine, reproof, correction and righteousness. The Scriptures enable us to do anything God asks us to do. (2 Timothy 3:16-17; 1 Corinthians 1:30)
