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I. Introduction.

- C. Our objective is to engage the enemy and release the captives. The church is on the offensive. (Isaiah 43:5-7, 49:25, 61:1, Matthew 16)
- D. Essentially, the ministry is to win the lost and build up the saved. This is a God given objective for every Christian.
- E. Results are expected of ministry objectives. There is an aggressive goal to turn the lost from the power of Satan to God. (Acts 26:16)
