Authority and Sufficiency of Scripture Lorne Sanny

Introduction.

- A. This past year has proved to be a major turning point in the Navigators.
- B. Most of the objectives I inherited have been fulfilled.
- C. Now we need new insight and direction to evaluate where God wants us to go and where I should minister personally. Fundamental truths are true for anyone, not just Navigators.
- I. There are three basic principles we must live by which are more important than anything else.
 - A. The word of God is to be taken seriously.
 - 1. Dawson Trotman was converted through Scripture memory.
 - 2. Believing the promises of God is essential to serving God.
 - 3. The early Navigators often spent 4-6 hours a day studying the Bible.
 - 4. Scripture memory courses and other Bible correspondence courses are critical.
 - 5. The Bible is a map for obedience and for conduct.
 - 6. There are sly inroads trying to get us off course. (Genesis 3)
 - 7. There is a three fold division of authority of Scripture
 - a. Evangelical.
 - b. Traditional which states tradition supplies what is lacking in Scripture.
 - c. Subjective view makes man's opinion the authority of truth.
 - 1. Some try to improve in Christ.
 - 2. Some try to rewrite Scripture.
 - 3. A friend went to seminary and found his confidence in the Scripture waning, and his effectiveness waned also. When he repented and asserted the authority of Scripture he again became a soul winner.

8. God spoke in many ways but in these last days he speaks through his Son in the word. (Hebrews 1)

- a. Christ is our authority but we know him through his Word.
- b. If we want to know Christ we must know his Word.

- B. Authority is defined as the property which demands faith and obedience in all its declarations.
 - 1. It's not for me to decide what to believe and not to believe but to submit to the illumination of the Scriptures under the power of the Holy Spirit.
 - a. The Scriptures repeat that it is the Lord who speaks. (Isaiah 42:5)
 - b. Jesus explained his ministry through the Scriptures. (Luke 24:25-27)
 - c. Peter explained his ministry in light of the Scriptures. (2 Peter 1:16-21)
 - d. The testimony of Jesus is that his word will not pass away. (Matthew 24:35)
 - e. He who rejects Christ will be judged by the word. (John 12:48)
 - f. Paul explained his ministry in light of the word. (1 Thessalonians 2:13)
 - g. Ignorant and unstable people distort the word. (2 Peter 3:15-16)
 - 2. What do we do about the authority of Scripture?
 - a. We accept it by faith because we cannot resolve the intellectual problems.
 - 1. Billy Graham had questions from time to time.
 - 2. He got down on his knees and accepted the truth of the word by faith.
 - b. We need to obey the word by faith. (John 7:17)
 - 1. We don't think our way to faith.
 - 2. We obey our way to faith.
 - 3. The Bible fits into life as I find it.
 - 4. Obedience and application reaffirms the truthfulness of the Bible.
 - 5. God does not satisfy curiosity seekers but rewards them that seek him.
 - c. We need to use the word of God.
 - 1. You don't need to defend the lion just let him loose.
 - 2. The word is like a hammer that breaks the rock in pieces. (Jeremiah 23:29)
 - 3. A backslidden friend of mine told me to not share the Bible with him so I merely quoted him Ecclesiastes on judgment. (Ecclesiastes 11:9)

4. Do we really believe the word is authoritative?

- C. The sufficiency of Scripture is also important. (2 Timothy 3:14)
 - 1. Faith in Christ saves us but the word of God leads to him.
 - 2. Scripture is profitable for teaching, correcting and for training in righteousness.
 - 3. Secular counselors define problems, but the Scripture has the answers.
 - 4. Scripture is sufficient to bring a person to salvation. (Luke 16: 27-31)
 - 5. Jesus explained his resurrection in light of the Scriptures. (Luke 24:27, 45)
 - 6. Our faith needs to stand in the power of God (1 Cor 2)
 - 7. What should we do? We need to preach the word. (2 Timothy 4:2).
 - 8. Martin Luther was told to derive his theology from the Bible only and he did even in the face of imminent danger of his life.
 - a. We today don't usually face that kind of danger.
 - b. We face a more subtle danger of compromising the truth.
- II. What does all this have to do with the Navigators?
 - A. We will submit to the Scriptures illuminated by the Holy Spirit.
 - B. We will not despise scholarship but will place primacy on the Scripture.
 - C. Our policy and method is derived from the Scriptures.
 - D. We seek to rewrite lives by the power of the Scripture by knowing and obeying it.
 - E. We need to be experts at war. (Song of Solomon 3:8)
