Five Laws of Disciple Making Skip Gray

- I. Introduction.
- II. Truth.
 - A. Truth is the foundation of what appears to be.
 - B. Today, the only absolute is that there are no absolutes.
 - C. Jesus and the Bible are truth—we have no basis for separating them. (John 17; 12:48)
 - D. God reveals truth in His Son and in His Word. (Psalm 57:3, John 1:14)
 - E. Men either receive or reject truth. (II Thessalonians 2:10, Romans 1:18, John 18:37, I Peter 1:22)
- III. The five laws of disciple making.
 - A. Create an atmosphere that optimizes the possibility of personal discovery of the truth. (II Kings 6:15-17)
 - 1. If men and women will become disciples of Jesus, it will be because God will reveal Himself to them.
 - 2. If there is no self-discovery then one will tire of this program. (Galatians 3:21)
 - B. Give the disciple opportunities for exposure to the truth commensurate with his capacity to comprehend. (Isaiah 28:9-10)
 - 1. Take in as much as sufficient. (John 16:12)
 - 2. Keep in mind a person's capacity.
 - C. Truth is best communicated by both precept and example simultaneously. (I Thessalonians 1:5-6)
 - D. The target of truth is the conscience and not merely the intellect. We must be careful not to be "junior Holy Spirits." (II Corinthians 3, I Timothy 1:5)
 - E. The ultimate confidence of the disciple maker is in the Holy Spirit and truth.
 - 1. The ultimate confidence is not to be in one's gifts and talents. (Acts 20)

2. We cannot do anything against the truth. (II Corinthians 13:8)
