I. Introduction.

- A. We have been chosen that we might bear fruit.
 - 1. Character. (Galatians 5:22-23)
 - 2. Influence.
- B. Text: Matthew 13:36-38, John 12:24-26.
- II. We are "seeds." If you are a child of the king Jesus, you are a seed among other things.
- III. Jesus is the farmer.
- IV. The field is the world.
 - A. The seed does not choose where it gets to go.
 - B. The farmer decides where the seed will go.
 - C. We must be available to serve wherever God wants us.
- V. Unless the seed dies, it abides alone. If it dies, it bears much fruit.
 - A. The believer who hates his life will bear fruit.
 - B. Death means to relinquish control. (I Corinthians 14:32, Ecclesiastes 8:8)

1. One's life is the sum total of all his or her activities, relationships and possessions. (Luke 14:25-26, Ephesians 5)

- 2. We must esteem our life as nothing in comparison to our love for Christ.
- 3. If we do not relinquish our life, we will abide alone.
- C. We have to be open-handed about our possessions, activities and relationships.
- VI. The seed that dies forms deep roots. Deep roots give strength. (Isaiah 37:31, Romans 7:4)

VII. The seed produces life. (Mark 4:28)

VIII. One bears fruit in season. (Psalm 1)

A. It is a mistake to compare fruit with other Christians because everyone is in different seasons.

- B. The fruit of influence will come in its time.
- IX. Multiplication. (Genesis 1:29)
 - A. We have to be careful not to play junior Holy Spirit.
 - B. When the time comes to die, do not stand in God's way.
