I. Introduction.

- A. There are basic steps to the divine life cycle of fruitfulness.
- B. Texts: Matthew 13:36-38, John 12.
- II. There are steps in the divine life cycle.
 - A. The seed. We are many things in Christ, but God sees us as a seed.
 - B. The farmer.
 - 1. Jesus is the farmer who plants the seed.
 - 2. The sower knows best where to plant the seed.
 - 3. The seed does not know where best to be planted.
 - a. Seeds do not have rights.
 - b. We must be available to God.
 - C. The field is the world.
- III. The seed must die in order to bear fruit. (John 12:24)
 - A. The seed does have an option to die here or abide alone.
 - B. The seed that dies denies itself.
 - C. To die means to relinquish control of life.
 - D. Life is the sum total of all one's relationships, activities, and possessions.
 - F. We must be open-handed with all that we have.
 - G. Every time we surrender some area to the Holy Spirit, God exposes another area.
- IV. The seed that dies forms deep roots. (Isaiah 37:31)
 - A. Fruit is a result of relationship with Christ. (Romans 7:4)
 - B. We must develop our secret life with Christ.
- V. The seed bears life. (Mark 4:28)
 - A. The process is as important as the product.
 - B. There are no shortcuts to fruitfulness.

VI. One bears fruit in season. (Psalm 1:1-3, Jeremiah 17:7-8)

A. Every believer has his or her own season.

B. It is a mistake to compare fruit with other Christians because everyone is in different seasons.

VII. Seed. (Genesis 1:29)

A. Your fruit becomes someone else's seed.

B. We cannot play junior Holy Spirit when someone we love is called to "die."
