I. Introduction.

- A. David was distressed at times.
- B. Text: Psalm 119.
 - 1. The author is unknown.
 - 2. He must have been a praying person because every verse is a prayer.
 - 3. Every verse refers to the Scripture in some way. The author was a Bible centered person.
 - 4. Since he was a godly person, all the more startling is the last verse of the psalm where the author confesses that he has gone astray.
- II. We all go astray.
 - A. We go astray in our words.
 - B. We go astray in our deeds.
- III. We are to seek our servant.
 - A. In recognition that the psalmist cannot get back with God on his own, he beckons God.
 - B. This is grace—the gospel of God.
 - 1. The psalmist had a firm grip on the grace of God. This is underserved help from God.
 - 2. Grace is letting God do something for us before we do something for Him.
- IV. We do not forget His commandments.
 - A. We are made to be Christians, so even our body will not let us forget His commandments.
 - B. The Ten Commandments are not merely rules—they express God's character and are written in the constitution of the universe and of man.
 - C. You do not break the ten commandments—they break you.
