Applications:

- 1. The Mosaic Law was for the nation of Israel only, covering the period from Mt. Sinai to the cross, and was given (a) as a constitution for the nation Israel, (b) to demonstrate Israel's critical need of righteousness (Romans 3:20) and to prepare the way for the coming of that salvation in Christ.
- 2. Christians today are not under the Mosaic Law (not under any part of it), and any attempt to place us under the Law is legalism and should be resisted (Galatians 5:1).
- 3. Freedom from the Law (contrary to popular opinion) should not produce lawlessness in Christians but should rather produce a mature, Spirit-led relationship to God as befitting adult sons in His family.
