Applications:

- 1. Christians should be the best citizens in any society. This includes:
 - a. Paying taxes
 - b. Serving in the military when needed
 - c. Voting
 - d. Participating in community, state and federal life (including office-holding for some)
 - e. Jury duty
 - f. Proper respect for civil officials (even those of a different party!)
 - g. Etc., etc., etc.
- 2. There is, of course, a limit to subjection when government requires an ungodly act (cf. Acts 4:13f., 5:29, Matthew 2:8-12, etc.).
- 3. As this age grows darker and evildoers abound, the Christian should draw even closer to his Lord in holy living, awaiting His appearing.
