- (3) For both: Let each be fully persuaded in his own mind (14:5c)

 - a. The folly of passing judgment on matters of personal Christian liberty (14:6-13a)
 - b. The danger of injuring weak consciences (14:13b-15:4)
 - c. The responsibility of Jews and Gentiles alike to be of one mind in Christ because of the divine purpose for each group (15:5-13)

Applications:

The "weaker brother" doctrine, if conscientiously applied, would virtually eliminate petty problems in the church. Yet it seems to be almost totally unknown. Essentially it relates to our concern for the well-being of others as a priority over our own "rights". You may want to use the "King James English", the "cosmetics" and/or the "mixed bathing" examples in your class. In addition, select issues that may be current bones of contention in your own church, and apply the doctrine. Movies? Sunday observance? Dress? Music? Remember that this doctrine applies only in the "gray" areas, i.e. areas where the Word of God has no specific teaching.
