A. If you are a child of the king Jesus, you are a seed among other things.
B. We need to perceive ourselves this way.

B. We must be available to serve wherever God wants us.
C. The tragedy of not being available to God is that we will not be as effective even where we are.
V. Unless the seed dies, it abides alone. If it dies, it bears much fruit.
A. Many believers abide alone because they are unwilling to die.
B. The believer who hates his life will bear fruit.
1. This means to relinquish control. (Ecclesiastes 8:8)
2. One's life is the sum total of all his or her activities and relationships.
C. We have to be open-handed about our possessions and relationships.
D. Whatever Jesus says to do we are to do.
