## Commitment to Relationships Skip Gray

## I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Philippians 2:25.
- B. Epaphroditus was Paul's brother, companion in labor, fellow soldier.
  - 1. The brother is the first relationship among Christians.
  - 2. The companion in labor is a tighter relationship. Not every Christian is laboring.
  - 3. The fellow soldier is the person whom one shares common experiences. These are the people we rely on—there is an unfiltered relationship and an oneness.
- C. The fellow soldier has a common purpose, authentic accountability and freedom.
- II. A common purpose. (Philippians 1:27)
  - A. Sometimes we become so professional and organized that we channel people and end up all alone.
  - B. We want to have others whom we have a shared purpose. (Daniel 1:8, Acts 16:10)
  - C. There is mutuality to this kind of relationship.
- III. An authentic accountability.
  - A. We are called to walk in the light and exhort one another daily. (I John 1, Hebrews 3:13)
  - B. Sin is deceitful and it hardens a person. We need to encourage one another in order to thwart this.
  - C. We need people to come along side of us to encourage us daily. (Luke 22:28, II Corinthians 6:11-14)
- IV. Freedom. We serve one another by giving space.
