I. Introduction.

A. Nothing we have in life ought to be a treasure—the focus of our trust must not be on material things. (Matthew 6:19-21)

B. Our treasure needs to be people.

A. God is in control.

B. God works everything for good. (Genesis 50:20, Romans 8:28)

C. God's glory is at the center of His definition of goodness.

D. Bitterness can destroy us, so we must believe that God is in control.

E. The bottom line of human experience is the character of God.

III. The centrality of the Scripture.

A. We have everything we need for life and holy living. (II Peter 1:3-4)

B. Without believing that there is a fixed reference point, there is confusion. The Bible is the fixed reference point.

IV. The value of the individual.

A. Your gifts and weaknesses are evidences of God's love. (I Corinthians 12:18)

B. Our weaknesses intensify our awareness of how much we need each other.

C. Do not compare yourself to others.

D. If you do not believe that God has given you value as an individual, you will end up in despair. (Proverbs 13:20)

E. We need to comfort one another and be comforted.

V. The servant lifestyle of the believer.

A. Jesus became a servant. (Philippians)

B. There is tension in Scripture: the poor are important but not determinative. (Luke 14, I Peter 3, Galatians 2:10)

C. We are called to be servants and not doormats. There is sensitivity.

D. The alternative to service is interpersonal conflict.
