E. Babylon began at the tower of Babel. It pictures any group or party attempting to gain power through religious deceitfulness.

 - A. The sin of Satan is narcissism.
 - B. Satan forgot his dependency on God and focused on himself.
 - C. The nature of sin is to play god.
 - 1. Inner psychological integrity is at stake.
 - 2. Pride is the idolatry of self and the national religion of hell.
- IV. The desolation of Moab. Moab pictures worldliness.
- V. Damascus will cease to be a city.

VI. There is a picture of the last days when the ruler of the world will make a covenant with Israel with the overcoming of the forces of Gog and Magog. Israel will be restored.

VII. The burden of Egypt.

- A. Egypt will see that Israel's sustenance is from the hand of the Lord.
- B. They will turn and fear God.

C. The Lord will make Himself known to the Egyptians.

D. The Lord will correct Egypt and rebuke it but heal it by those means.

VIII. That which is highly esteemed among men is an abomination before the Lord.

IX. There will be a great restoration.
