I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Jeremiah 7-10.
- B. The tragedy of Judah is the tragedy of people today—when people forsake God they lose their own sense of worth.
- C. If one struggles with his own self-worth, one will struggle with the worth of others as well.
- D. The most baffling time as a Christian is when God acts contrary to expectation.
- II. God told Jeremiah to do two astonishing things.
 - A. He was not to intercede for the people in prayer because God would not hear those prayers. One does not expect that God would ask someone to stop praying for people.
 - B. He was to keep preaching to the people even though he was not to pray for them, and God promised that they would not listen to prayers for them.
- III. God challenged Judah by saying that their religious rituals were meaningless in light of their disobedience. (II Chronicles 34-35)
 - A. The people were counting on the Law and that the temple had been cleaned.
 - B. They were trusting in performance and outward ritual without realizing that God knows the heart.
 - C. All that was left for them to open their eyes was judgment.
- IV. What God does when a nation turns from Him.
 - A. He warns of the consequences.
 - B. He calls to awaken a response of love and gratitude.
 - C. Judgment is the final step—it is God's last desperate act to bring one back.
 - 1. This is why God asks Jeremiah to preach but not pray.
 - 2. Radical surgery was all that was left.
 - 3. Prayer was to cease because prayer delays judgment.
- V. God reveals His greatness beyond that of man.
 - A. Man's wisdom is not enough—unlike God's it is partial.

- B. Man's might is not enough—his force is only directed at material things.
- C. Riches are limited in what they can buy, and they are deceitful giving someone a feeling of power, love and respect that is not true.
- D. One ought to glorify in that he knows God and has access to His wisdom, might and riches.
