## Case of the Lavish Farmer Ray Stedman

## I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Matthew 13:3-9, 18-23.
- B. Jesus said that these parables would be open to anyone who would listen to them.
- II. The parable of the sewer.
  - A. Jesus often picked up what was happening right around Him as an illustration.
  - B. The disciples prompted Jesus for an explanation since there was none. You only have truth when you act on it.
  - C. Elements of the parable.
    - 1. The seed is the invisible kingdom.
      - a. All of life is not contained in what can be detected by the senses.
      - b. In that kingdom is all that man is looking for—the word of the kingdom is the good news—the gospel.
      - c. In the gospel is the power of God and the righteousness of God.
    - 2. The soil is the human heart.
    - 3. The birds represent the evil one. The devil seeks to take away the good news from the man.
    - 4. The rocky soil represents the shallow life. People that have no depth receive the gospel with joy but the season changes and they deny it.
    - 5. The third type of heart is the one choked by the hunger for riches. Busyness keeps him from the gospel.
    - 6. The good soil bears fruit. It is not a hard heart. It receives the word and understands it. Its life is not shallow. This is the only heart that is genuinely Christian.
  - D. Hearts can change—a single individual can pass through all of those stages. We must pray that God would make our hearts good soil.
