- A. Text: Romans 1:18-32.
- B. It is necessary to know where a person is to get directions. The first thing a person must know is the question God asks in Genesis—where are you?
- C. Romans answers where a man is.
- II. No one dies without a chance to know God—there is a universal revelation of God and no one has ever lived without knowledge of God.
 - A. Revelation is universal. (Psalm 19)
 - B. There is much knowledge we can have about God if we listen. (Hebrews 11)
 - 1. God is a God of power—the power of nature shows a force behind all of it.
 - 2. God's sovereignty is shown in the danger and power of nature.
 - C. It is not enough to know about God—one must act on it in faith.

 - A. He does not give thanks.
 - B. They claimed to be wise.
 - 1. When man insults God, he makes an idol of Him.
 - 2. Man rejects Christianity because he has a caricature of Him in their mind.
