- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: I Corinthians 9:24-10:13.
 - B. For Paul life was like a race.
- II. We are to run the race in order to be a pleasing instrument to God.
 - A. This was Paul's main objective.
 - B. God put you in the place you are so that He might use you.
- III. Discipline is necessary that God might use you.
 - A. We are not only to avoid bad things but indulgences that might hinder our spiritual goals.
 - B. The Christian needs both discipline and dependence.
 - C. Paul remembers that at the end of his life, everyone will look at what you did for Jesus Christ—life means service and giving oneself for the cause of God.
- IV. It is possible to be disqualified.
 - A. God will turn off the power to your ministry. (Hebrews)
 - 1. We are protected, and guided as Christians.
 - 2. We are baptized into Christ identifying with Him.
 - 3. We are all strengthened by Christ.
 - 4. However, even in light of this we can all be disqualified.
 - B. Four danger points to watch.
 - 1. Watch out for indulging in idols.
 - 2. Do not indulge in fornication.
 - 3. Beware of presumptuous blaming of God.
 - 4. Do not grumble or complain.
 - C. We are fighting a battle and we must not forget it.
- V. With temptation, God provides the way of escape.

- A. Testing is common to all.
- B. Testing has controlled pressure—it is not beyond our limits.
- C. Testing has conquering grace through the way of escape—dependence.
