- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: Ephesians 5:21.
 - B. The most common charge levied against the Christian church today is that it is irrelevant.
 - C. Wherever this is true, it is due to a departure from Scripture.
- II. Paul's solution to conflict: be subject to one another out of reverence to Christ.
 - A. The solution must start at the level of the individual, not the state or society—there is an absence of appeal to corporate action.
 - B. The simple act is to be subject to one another out of reverence to Christ.
 - C. People generally approach challenges by asking what they can get out of the situation—inevitably, this results in a collision course with someone else who has similar desires. This results in conflict.
 - D. Paul's principles.
 - 1. He introduces a third party: Christ.
 - a. There is always someone else present in a matter.
 - b. The great question for the Christian is not what I want but what Christ wants for me.
 - c. The problem is that our pride often gets in the way.
 - d. Whatever we have yielded ourselves to obey is our god.
 - 2. He introduces the means to fulfillment.
 - a. It is only when one forgets oneself and his own fulfillment that he can find his own satisfaction.
 - b. The man who gives himself to making money suffers from destination sickness.
 - c. We only have our rights by insisting to give them to others.
