Wage the Good Warfare Ray Stedman

I. Introduction.

- A. Text: I Timothy 1:18-20.
- B. Paul's word to Timothy is to wage the good warfare.

II. The moment a person enters the Christian life, he enters a life-long struggle.

A. The object of the warfare is to be a Christian in the midst of any circumstance.

B. Christ lived in the midst of normal life--He dealt earnestly and lovingly in the pressures around Him.

C. What makes the struggle difficult is that the world, the flesh and the devil oppose us.

- 1. The world is society committed to a godless philosophy.
- 2. The flesh is that part of us that only wants to live for ourselves.
- 3. The devil is always trying to deceive us.
- III. Paul encourages Timothy by his desire to please him.
- IV. How to wage a good warfare.
 - A. Hold to faith.
 - B. Have a good conscience.
 - 1. The conscience is not merely feelings about what is wrong and what is right.

2. The conscience takes advantage of what we already know is right or wrong--it does not tell us what is right or wrong.

- 3. Revelation is what tells us what is right or wrong.
- 4. The Christian life is knowing what is right and having the resolve to do it.

C. Many do not maintain a good conscience and need to be corrected by the church--they are delivered to the discipline of "Satan" if they do not repent.

D. We are called to live a Christian life in a godless world, which is a fierce battle.

1. How would you respond to someone who says that no one should have to suffer anymore once he or she becomes a Christian?

2. What are the threats to our faith? How should we respond to each?

3. What does it mean to have a good conscience? Explain.
